IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Principals relying on this certificate should ensure that it is accompanied by a statement under section 175B of the *Workers Compensation Act 1987*. Principals should also check and satisfy themselves that the information is correct and ensure that proper workers compensation insurance is in place – i.e. compare the number of employees on site to the average number of employees estimated and ensure that the Wages estimated are reasonable to cover the labour component of the work being performed.

A principal contractor may become liable for any outstanding premium of the subcontractor if the principal has failed to obtain a statement or has accepted a statement where there was reason to believe it was false.

This certificate covers the number of employees and the industry/industries noted.

Schedule 1 of the *Workplace Injury Management and Workers Compensation Act 1998* defines certain individuals as being deemed workers. Principals and employers should ensure that where deemed workers are engaged, the full amount of the contract payments are included in the total estimated wages. The Act extends the definition of workers to persons not generally considered to be employees, such as some contractors, taxi drivers and outworkers. Although such people may not be employees, they are deemed to be workers for the purpose of workers compensation insurance. A business that engages contractors who are deemed to be workers is considered to be an employer, even if the business has no direct employees.
